FUNDING MATTERS

PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING AS A WAY TO GET FUNDING FOR YOUR MEN'S SHED

We look at how Participatory budgeting (PB) is changing the way funding is spent at a local level.

Firstly, a bit of an explanation as to what PB is. Andrew Paterson, Policy and Research Officer from Scottish Community Development Centre & Community Health Exchange explains:

"Participatory budgeting (PB) simply put, means local people have a direct say on how funding is spent. It can be any type of budget, but normally involves members of the community deciding through a voting process how to spend part of the budget of a public agency such as a local authority."

PB has really taken off in Scotland over the last few years, supported by the Scottish Government's Community Choices fund, which has helped local authorities and community organisations to organise PB in their local areas. In most cases this has consisted of community events, where voluntary organisations and community groups have bid for funding with

local people getting to decide which projects get funded.

There are two ways that Men's Sheds in Scotland might be interested in taking part in PB:

Firstly, you could find out where local PB is being planned and apply to bid for funding – you would normally have to think of a specific project or piece of work that would need funding and make a pitch for this. Keith and District Men's Shed successfully bid for funding in last year's Money for Moray PB event. In the Perth area Kinross Men's Shed successfully bid for £1,500 in 2017 and a further £2,000 was awarded in March 2018 when they were voted the number 1 project in their area.

Secondly, you could think about helping to organise PB locally, possibly with other local organisations. Most community-led PB programmes have received funding from Community Choices.

Some current initiatives are listed here, although many will have

closed for applicantions since the financial year finishes at the end of March. However, this is one that is worth keeping an eye on when next year's funding is announced.

You can sign up with PB Scotland for free to be first to know of future developments. It might also be useful to contact your local authority to find out whether any future PB events are being planned and get on their mailing lists.

CORRA FOUNDATION - HENRY DUNCAN GRANTS

This grant-making programme supports grassroots charities operating in Scotland

To apply, charities must be delivering programmes or services which are clearly focused on improving the quality of life for members of the community facing disadvantage.

One-off awards of up to £7,000 are made to charities for core funding, such as running costs or salaries, or

project funds and they will also consider applications for small capital costs such as equipment. Fort William and Shettleston have previously received grants in the region of £3k

BUILDING BETTER COMMUNITIES

Jewson's support projects up and down the country through their Building Better Communities prize fund.

How much is up for grabs?

There is a top regional prize of £50k for labour & building and several prizes of between £500 and £10,000.

How to apply

Applications open on 27th March to 5th May 2018. The process seems straight forward enough. Simply submit 300 words about your project and provide some photos and videos to bring your entry to life. Full details can be found on their <u>website</u>.

APPLY TO BE A CO-OP LOCAL CAUSE

The Co-op Community Fund is now open for groups to apply for a share of it's 2018/19 funding pot.

Preference is given to projects run by small, local organisations that make a real difference to people in their community – **that's your Men's Shed!**

You have until 8 April 2018 to complete your application. To apply online visit their <u>website</u> where you will also find full terms and conditions including details of how the fund works.

Men's Sheds that we know have been lucky with this fund in the past include **Barrhead** and **Ellon**.

up a 100 Club which is a great way to help support the Sheds needs and give the Shedders a wee chance of a nice return on their entry!

A 100 Club is a bit like a private lottery in that subscribers buy numbered tickets which are entered into a regular draw, e.g. 100 tickets for a 100 Club. When the tickets are drawn, a percentage of the profit is given as the prize, with the remainder going to Shed funds.

You can set the prizes for however much you want. Kinross for example have 1st and 2nd prizes of 30% and 10% of the total fund and have set the cost of each draw at £4 (limited to 2 per person) to be drawn monthly.

LOTTERY WINNERS

Carse of Gowrie is the latest Scottish Men's Shed to come up trumps by successfully applying for funding through the Big Lottery Award for All Scotland scheme. The Shed received £9,990 in February for more equipment to meet growing demand for the wood turning, woodworking, and engineering lessons they offer to men. This is the second time the Shed has received funding from Awards for All Scotland. Details on how to apply for the fund can be found here.

WHAT SHEDS NEED TO KNOW ABOUT DATA PROTECTION BY JASON SCHROEDER



The law is changing around Data Protection on the 25 May 2018 – this is D-day.

Since writing a comprehensive article in **Edition 2** of **The Scottish Shedder** I have had enquiries about Sheds and their Data Protection so I thought it would be useful to include an edited down version of that article below. To read the full article visit our online Individual Members Resource library - Ed 2.

The way things stand at the moment, the basics around data protection are:

You should only have enough information about your members which you need for specific and related purposes. Most Sheds ask for name, contact details, an emergency contact person, health

details e.g. heart condition, diabetic, epilepsy, dementia etc and hobbies and interests. This is all valid info used to keep the Shed running smoothly in compliance if you have a constitution, have become a charity and most importantly looking out for your members in case something happens to them while in the Shed.

You shouldn't be asking for information on any past or present criminal convictions. For example, if your Shed is open to all men there is no need to have this information and would create exclusion policies which might contravene the law, your constitution and Scottish Charity regulations. Men's Sheds are about inclusion and we realise this can bring up difficult personal issues for us, but they are personal issues not necessarily legal ones.

Your records of members data should be under lock and key and accessible only to board members and your daily Shed supervisor. If this data is also on a computer we suggest it might be safer to have it on an encrypted external hard drive held by a board member, usually the Secretary of the Shed.

We don't know exactly what is going to change until this new legislation is passed, so suggest you do your own research and keep up to date with this changing legislation and how it might affect you. We will do the same and revisit this after the 25 May 2018, to see if any of this new legislation affects us and you. For up to date information visit the Information Commissioner's Office website.

Please do give yourselves at **least 60 days** before your policy finishes to get this in for a new quote. We have heard too many Shed stories of leaving it to the last minute, panicking and then getting the wrong cover of insurance and expensive costs.

SPOTLIGHT ON:

Garnock Valley Men's Shed

Having secured a temporary occupational licence for a former local authority Cleansing and Grounds Maintenance Depot in Kilbirnie Public Park, North Ayrshire the Kilbirnie Shed group are redeveloping the building for community use. Using the Men's Shed approach and planning to be fully operational by springtime, the group's aim is to provide free space for men in the Garnock Valley to come together and to address a variety of health and social issues.

A recent advert placed on Facebook for tool donations got an amazing response. Once word got out that there was a community-based



project aiming to open up free space, the tools

started flooding in. Local businesses are keen to get in on the action. W & J Knox, a fishing net manufacturing and maintenance company based in Kilbirnie has donated 250 used wooden pallets, which are being disassembled and used to build everything from garden planters to log stores and bird boxes. The group even has plans to build a tea room inside the workshop themed as an authentic log cabin — a clear example of thinking 'inside the box.'

Another interesting wee development recently is the introduction of a music room inspired by a recent impromptu performance led by our piano man John who comes and offers free keyboard lessons (see page 2). We put a heater in one of the small side





rooms for the keyboard lessons and are now looking at decorating it with a musical theme with 3D sheet music on the walls.

Drop-in and see us on Tuesday and Thursday mornings 10.00am – 12.30pm. We'd love to see you and share our enthusiasm for bringing men together and building and fixing things for community benefit.

The Project is now well underway and the response from Shedders across Scotland has been fantastic. A big thank you to those who have come forward to take part in the study.

I've been travelling around Scotland and visiting Sheds to learn more about what you do and have met some amazing people on the way. It has been massively important to me to spend time finding out what makes Sheds different to other community organisations, so that I can represent you in the best way possible. BOOK A FREE BOWEL CANCER AWARENESS TALK FOR YOUR SHED WITH BOWEL CANCER UK

April is Bowel Cancer awareness month.

Bowel cancer is currently the third most common cancer in Scotland and the second biggest cancer killer. Over 3,700 people in Scotland are diagnosed with bowel cancer each year, and approximately 1,600 people die from the disease.

However, it doesn't have to be this way, as bowel cancer is treatable and curable, especially when caught early. If diagnosed at the earliest stage, over 98% of people will survive bowel cancer. That's why we're dedicated to raising awareness through our bowel cancer awareness talks.

Free awareness materials will also be available, and our volunteers are happy to answer any questions you might have.

What's covered in the 30 - minute talk?

WHAT'S COOKING?

Given that it's Bowel Cancer awareness month, we thought we would go with something that well, eases the load!

PORRIDGE! Everyone has their opinion on whether it's better with salt or sugar, but why not ditch both and opt for the healthy options below:

Grated apple, blackberry and pecan - Grate up a little apple and stir into the porridge. Once it's cooked, top with some blackberries and chopped pecan nuts for extra crunch.



Chocolate banana - Mash up most of a ripe banana – the riper the better as it will add natural sweetness – then cook in with the oats and about 2 tsp cocoa powder (or to taste). Stir well and serve with the remaining banana sliced on top.

Feeling adventurous? Try the delicious overnight oats recipe below. It's simple and quick to do and you will be rewarded with a creamy mixture of softened oats and fruit, that's somewhere between a fruit yogurt and porridge.

Overnight Porridge

Serves 2

Taken from the BBC Good Food website

- 100g porridge oats
- 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon
- 250ml apple juice
- 2 apples, grated
- 100g blueberries

Mix the porridge oats with the cinnamon in a large bowl. Stir in the apple juice and grated apples, then gently fold in the blueberries. Allow to stand for 5 mins before serving, or leave overnight and enjoy for breakfast the next day.
