CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

I have to report that the last twelve months have been the hardest that the SMSA has faced, since it was created in 2014, due to the current COVID-19 pandemic.

A year of almost total shutdown with only a few outdoor activities being able to carry on but many resourceful Sheds have managed to keep connected with their members by adopting Zoom, Microsoft Teams or even YouTube as a platform of communication.

I am old enough to remember when Zoom was a description of speed in a cartoon but today it is accepted, at all levels, as a new norm way of holding meetings and general chat sessions. We have also been able to keep in touch with members throughout Scotland with The Scottish Shedder magazine for which I would like to thank Michelle for all her hard work, professionalism and her understanding of the ethos of Men's Sheds.

On the political front, we have enjoyed support across all of the main parties in Scotland with an excellent debate in the Scottish Parliament in February 2021 which has resulted in the Scottish Government talking about longer-term funding for the SMSA.

For the first time, the SMSA prepared a Manifesto outlining our ambitions for the association going forward. This Manifesto was distributed to all candidates in the forthcoming Scottish election and will then be sent to all successful MSPs thereby keeping the SMSA and the grassroots Movement in the forefront of their minds. The 2020 'Men's Shed of the Year' awards were very closely contested with Inverclyde Men's Shed being crowned the winner, Garnock Valley Men's Shed the runner-up and Kinross and District Men's Shed in third position. Thank you to everyone who voted and we look forward to nominations for 2021.

We can now look forward to getting Sheds reopened as soon as the Scottish Government announce that it is safe to do so therefore the SMSA has issued its guidance for reopening and we encourage all Sheds to follow this to protect Shedders.

Our Association and member Sheds will have even greater demands made upon them, in the near future, as more men will require the kind of facilities and opportunities that Sheds provide following this prolonged period of pandemic. Sheds have always been resourceful and I am confident that they will be again in meeting the demands made upon them.

Sue Salter joined our team in March 2021 and has taken responsibility for the administration role and I would like to officially welcome her to the SMSA. May I also on a personal note thank Jason for all his support and advice in my first year as Chairman.

Finally, we are a growing organisation and require more Trustees to enable us to keep supporting Sheds and promoting the Shed movement therefore if you feel that you can make a positive contribution to the future of the SMSA, please let us know as working "shoulder to shoulder" is what the SMSA is all about.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

The SMSA team, Board of Trustees and Scottish Sheds have demonstrated tremendous resilience during the course of this year. These really were unprecedented and extraordinary times that our global community was not prepared for.

The pandemic changed all of our lives. Shed doors were forced to close and we all had to stay apart however, the 'togetherness' spirit and connectivity continued, albeit in a new form.

When COVID-19 hit, the SMSA's core funding from the Scottish Government immediately came under threat. We quickly produced a revised pandemic plan to ensure Shedders and supporters of the Movement stayed connected and we received funding to ensure our survival however this was vastly reduced to £50,000.

Due to this shortfall, the Association was not able to replace our Administrator for almost a year and this had a knock-on effect to the existing team who had to absorb this workload. Already stretched, we also had to seek alternative funding streams. This impacted on our own health and fatigue and tough choices had to be made to put on hold some of the vital support roles that we did pre-pandemic.

Our team moved to homeworking to ensure continuity and we quickly adapted to a new 'Zoom' world and having Shed Network Regional Meetings online instead of 'shoulder to shoulder'. We were able to keep Board members in the loop but also heard directly what were the most pressing issues for them and what support they required.

The information gathered from these online meetings then formed the bones of the SMSA's COVID-19 strategy and led to the development of our Shed-specific COVID-19 Reopening Guidance and idea to trial Pathfindr Safe Distancing Assistant units with ten Sheds. Following the success of the trial, the SMSA then secured £100,000 from the Scottish Government to roll this initiative out nationally and also offer an emergency funding pot for Sheds most severely affected by the pandemic to ensure no Shed faced permanent closure due to their inability to fundraise.

The Shedding community rose to the challenge creating personal protective equipment for frontline workers from the safety of their homes, delivered shopping and prescriptions to vulnerable members of their communities and introduced buddy systems and online forums to stay connected.

Over the course of the year, the Movement stayed strong and continued to grow at a steady pace. Shed Membership rose from 126 to 134 and Individual Membership increased from 2,315 to 2,522. Open and developing Men's Shed groups across Scotland is now totalled at 192—with a reach of 10,000+ men – which is phenomenal. The SMSA maintains good relationships with existing multi-year funders – The William Grant Foundation and the Scottish Government—and is delighted to welcome a new funder, The Robertson Group, who has committed to our cause over the next three years. It is fair to say that without their support – we would not still be here today.

The SMSA continued to work in partnership with Glasgow Caledonian University's <u>Sheds for Sustainable</u> <u>Development Project</u>. The University, in partnership with the SMSA, has built up extensive research, specific to Scotland, over a four-year period. This is a huge leap forward and for the first time ever, we now have briefings and internationally peer-reviewed published papers evidencing the impact and benefits of Scottish Men's Sheds on men's health and wellbeing to raise awareness and seek funding to grow the Movement further.

The spirit of the Movement as a whole, over this past year, has been nothing short of inspirational however, I am now witnessing the COVID-fatigue of some Shed Trustee Board members and we will continue to spearhead for improved localised support for the Shed Network through the appointment of Regional Development Officers across Scotland to assist volunteers in post-COVID-recovery over the next three to five years.

Our future plans include improving our reach to the Armed Forces and Veterans community and Blue Light services (police, fire services, emergency responders) to make them more aware of Sheds as a pathway choice.

The SMSA is represented on the Armed Forces and Veterans Community Cross-Party Group and we will also work in co-production with the relevant third and public sector agencies. The SMSA is also working in partnership with Education Scotland on exciting new developments for intergenerational working and film projects within our schools so watch this space.

The Association is trailblazing for social change to ultimately secure the future growth of this grassroots Movement to get the long-term commitment it rightly deserves.

TREASURER'S REPORT

This has been another financially challenging year for the SMSA with Shed closures, uncertainty over core funding and a loss of staff. The pandemic has had an unprecedented effect on the third sector as a whole and in that respect, the charity is thankful to report its survival and an overall surplus of income for the financial year.

This increased 'surplus', however, is a result of the ring-fenced grants received to support Men's Sheds across Scotland and makes financial reporting a little more complex this year. Total expenditure for the 1st April 2020 to 31st March 2021 period was £98,794 (£69,621 unrestricted and £29,173 restricted), with overall surplus of income over expenditure for the year being £136,692 (£58,365 unrestricted and £78,327 restricted).

The Association secured a £10,000 COVID-19 Business Support Grant and £50,000 core funding from the Scottish Government. £100,000 restricted funding was also received from the Scottish Government for emergency funding for Sheds severely affected by the pandemic and to provide and distribute Pathfindr Safe Distancing Assistants for Scottish Sheds. The Pathfindr devices were also supported (£7,500) through our partnership with the Scottish Community Alliance.

We are delighted to report multi-year funding in recognition of our vital work. The William Grant Foundation committed to three year funding and during this financial period provided two grants totalling £45,000. The Robertson Trust also provided £20,000 as part of its three-year support towards our core work. Without this, the SMSA could simply not continue.

improvements could be made in regards to men's experiences and awareness of cancer services - was granted in the previous financial year (2019/2020), however this work has been delayed due to COVID-19 and therefore remains in this year's accounts.

A fall in Shed membership subscriptions is reported; however, this is a result of the SMSA waiving these fees until 31st March 2021 when Sheds closed their doors in lockdown. An increase in general donations however, has counteracted this shortfall.

Turning to our vastly reduced operating costs. Staff and pension costs were significantly reduced due to the loss of our Administrator. Due to lockdown and the closure of SMSA's offices, the Association negotiated a reduction in rent resulting in a saving of approximately £6,000 for the year.

The restrictions on travel and moving Shed Network Regional Meetings online resulted in travel costs for the year of only £72 in comparison to £5,825 the previous year.

Whilst the reduction in some of these costs were due to the pandemic and/or out of our hands, the SMSA also strives to make savings wherever possible. Moving the SMSA newsletter, 'The Scottish Shedder', to a digital-only publication for example contributed to our total postage and printing costs being reduced from £4,390 in 2019/2020 to £1,668 in 2020/2021.

Going forward, the SMSA staff and board will continue to strive to make additional cost savings where possible. We will also proactively seek longterm commitment from new funders and supporters to ensure the sustainability and growth of the charitable Association.

It must also be noted that the £14,850 from Macmillan Cancer Support - to research what

A WORD FROM OUR PATRON



"It seems to me that Men's Sheds can play a significant role in post Covid recovery for those that use them. We need to look after each other."

The past 12 months have been hard. Many men will have lost someone close to them. Those who have recovered from the virus may be struggling with the problems of long Covid and the isolation of lockdown will have brought loneliness and depression to many.

While the vaccination programme has been successful in reducing the worst effects of the virus, as we move into winter, it is possible that improvements will slow and we will continue to experience further infections.

What can we do to recover our wellbeing? How can we feel in control again? My medical career taught me that people who were at risk of ill health because of poor diet, alcohol etc did not need to be told their habits were damaging their health. They knew perfectly well what they were doing.

Life was not good for them and, if the drink made them feel better, then they didn't care if it harmed them. I realised that the problem with Scotland's health was not too much illness, rather, it was not enough wellness!

So, what causes us to have a sense of wellbeing? Basically, it is a feeling of being in control of our lives. Extensive research has shown that having a network of friends you can turn to for support is an important driver of wellbeing.

One of the issues we are constantly thinking about in Scotland is health inequalities. Many people think that the answer to inequalities is to be found in political action. Minimum pricing of alcohol, banning smoking in public places have definitively had a positive impact on health. However, building that sense of wellbeing in people who are struggling requires a different approach.

I have realised that successful health improvement projects have one thing in common. They don't tell people what to do or what they need. Instead, they ask them "What matters to you? What do you need to feel better?" They then help that person achieve that aim. In doing so, the individuals begins to feel in control. The companionship of trusted friends is an important part of maintaining well-being in our lives.

Men's Sheds seem to me to be perfectly placed to support wellbeing in those that use them. They are described as being about "social connections and friendship building, sharing skills and knowledge, and of course a lot of laughter." This is the perfect description of a programme for creating and supporting wellbeing.

At this difficult time, when relationships are under strain and friends and relatives have been lost, we need positive social connections more than ever. It seems to me that Men's Sheds can play a significant role in post Covid recovery for those that use them. We need to look after each other.

Sir Harry Burns – Professor of Global Public Health, University of Strathclyde and President of the British Medical Association – was officially announced as the patron of the SMSA in March 2020. He was the Chief Medical Officer for Scotland for nine years (September 2005 to April 2014) and became renowned for his accomplishments in addressing health inequalities.

Sir Harry was knighted in 2011 in recognition of his outstanding achievement and service to society. He is a member of the Council of Economic Advisers in Scotland and, in December 2014, First Minister Nicola Sturgeon presented him with the Lifetime Achievement Award at the inaugural Scottish Public Service Awards, recognising his lasting contribution to public service.

The primary role of Sir Harry Burns, as SMSA patron, is to lend credibility and support to the SMSA. Within his prominent health roles and to his peers, he will represent the Men's Sheds Movement in Scotland.
