Jason Schroeder, SMSA's Chief Executive Officer, said: "The awards, now in their fourth year, celebrate and showcase the life-changing work being carried out in Men's Sheds across Scotland. This issue, covers just that. The Shedders of Scotland have been on a walkabout over summer.

The new SMSA Shed Member packs have been distributed, the office has returned to some normality and we wish to thank you for the great feedback and appreciation of our efforts in creating it for you.

Steve Curtis, Secretary of Garnock Valley Men's Shed, sent us this: "I just wanted to say how pleased we at Garnock Valley Men's Shed were to receive our new membership pack with our annual renewal.

"It is a well-presented solid pack with useful loose leaf flyers and the David Young Training is very good. The toolkit is a first class document with lots of relevant and easy to understand information giving good examples, explanations and advice. In summing up, I would say that this pack is extremely useful for both existing and potential Sheds."

All feedback is much appreciated as we need to keep re-evaluating our developmental direction to stay on the right track with our support and initiatives.

I have been working over the past year on an exciting new venture which is the very first SMSA Shed health animations. Funded by Macmillan Cancer, we launched the first one 'Guitar Mike' this month (see page 5) and it has received very favourable results. The second one is being created as I write this and hopefully in the next few weeks, we will be able to let you see it.

Veteran actor Ron Emslie, who is presently starring in the Edinburgh Fringe Festival 'Man Shed' play, has agreed to do the voice over for the second animation and having a man of his calibre is the cherry on the top. Do get some of the lads together to go see the play—I thoroughly enjoyed it and met up with Ron, the playwright Euan Martin and some of the guys from Dunfermline Men's Shed (pictured). It is an incredible script and performance in a very small intimate space called Bunker 1. Check out the trailer here.

We let our members know through a recent email communication that you could call your local Fire Service

to come and do a check of your Shed. Unfortunately, the information we received was incorrect and they don't have capacity to do such checks so apologies for that and we are following up that with what can be done. So watch this space.

We partnered with Education Scotland earlier in the year and the webinar about Men's Sheds from an educational perspective and for teachers has now been released in bite size chunks on their <u>website</u>. If you know any teachers please do forward the link to them.

Funding is a challenge for Sheds and we are in the exact same boat. So when a young Scotsman phones me from Australia and says he has heard from his Mom that a local Shed has given his Grandfather a new lease of life, he would like to support all of Scotland through what we do to help the SMSA continue its work.

He is trying to make a life for himself in another country, the home of Sheds but wants to help us back here, I was deeply touched. Thank you Fraser McGinlay for your generous \$1,000 donation. Equally on our own shores Kirsty Brown of Pageantquine did her own fundraising spreading the word about the SMSA and Scottish Men's Sheds and raised £141.50. The generosity and effort people go to in keeping this movement growing and thriving, with people like this who are not directly affected by it, gives me hope that 'others' aka funders might see the bigger vision and huge benefit this movement brings to our people of Scotland. Thank you one and all.

Lastly, to round up, we have opened the <u>SMSA 'Scottish Men's Shed of the Year' Awards 2022</u> and we are excited to say that we have new and returning prize supporters to entice you into sharing all the amazing things you have done throughout the year in your communities.

New animation promotes that 'men <u>do</u> talk' in Men's Sheds

Men don't talk – that is the perception anyway. Some men struggle to open up about their feelings, experiences, struggles and health matters but the Scottish Men's Sheds Association (SMSA) is quashing this theory by launching the first in a series of animations to promote that men do open up and talk in Scottish Men's Sheds.



SMSA CEO Jason Schroeder said: "We are producing these animations to educate and inform on the range of benefits that Men's Sheds can bring to men's health and wellbeing. The first animation promotes men coming together in a safe space and opening up to talk 'shoulder to shoulder' including sharing health matters that may be concerning them."

The <u>short animation</u>, based on a true story from a Scottish Shed member, features 'Guitar Mike' chatting with his Shedder pal over a cuppa when he mentions that he saw him limping. Mike tells him about a painful lump he had found above his knee and Charlie advises him not to wait around and get to the doctors sharpish. Mike did just that and it was only a matter of days before Mike was having a cancerous growth removed.

The real 'Guitar Mike', Mike Mowat from Glenrothes Men's Shed, said: "Many men do not open up about their feelings and end up keeping everything to themselves. Men's Sheds offer a friendly, safe and welcoming environment to make friends and socialise. I felt comfortable to share my health problems and talk to Charlie and I am now so glad that I did. I am delighted that my story is being shared - if my experience encourages just one person to seek help before it's too late then it will not be in vain."

Scottish actor Billy Mack, who does the voiceover for Charlie in the film, said: "I never really knew much about Men's Sheds until doing a rehearsed reading of a play by Clare Prenton entitled 'Men Don't Talk'. We, as a cast, were taken to a local Shed and introduced to the members and talked with them. As soon as I got home, I looked for my local branch but unfortunately there isn't one in Stirling as yet. Hopefully it won't be too long before we have one - they are a great way of building friendships and learning different skills but, above all, a place for people to talk about life and issues that may affect them. All villages, towns and cities should have one!"

The SMSA was formed in 2014 to provide support, information, advice and resources to its Shed Members and 3,000+ Individual Members. Today, there are over 200 open and developing Men's Sheds groups across Scotland reaching 10,000+ men (aged 18 or over) through the Movement.

SMSA NEWS—DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

Conversations on equalities

On my Shed visits, trustees talk about the pressures they are experiencing in being welcoming and inclusive, whilst maintaining the Shed ethos. This stress comes in the face of requests from external organisations and individuals.

At the moment, these calls are coming from two main sources:

- Social prescribers who want to signpost people, sometimes with complex health needs, to the Shed; and
- 2. Women who want to join the Shed or use the facilities.

Scottish Shedders have an innate sense of solidarity and fairness and will look favourably on these requests and use their problemsolving skills to find ways to accommodate them.

Women have played a key role in setting up and supporting Men's Sheds recognising that just as there are women-only safe spaces (lawful exceptions under the Equalities Act 2010) many communities lack the same opportunities for men.

In terms of gender, four main approaches are found in Sheds across Scotland:

- Male-only Men's Sheds. These are nothing like Muirfield Golf Club, Lerwick Up Helly Aa Guizer Yarl Squads or the Common Ridings that in the past excluded women. The difference is that Men's Sheds have the explicit or implicit aim of promoting men's health and suicide prevention at their heart and a single sex arrangement is proportionate to this aim.
- 2. Men's Sheds with a small number of women attending. In these Sheds, you often hear conversations like 'Jessie's one of the lads, swears like a trooper and gives as good as she gets'. Whilst this might be accurate, how do we know all men are happy with this arrangement and if some men no longer attend because they feel their safe space is compromised?

- Mixed or community Sheds that don't claim to be a safe space for men to pursue men's health aims. Instead, they are a place where men and women can engage in their different or shared hobbies and interests.
- 4. Men's Sheds with male-only, women-only and mixed sessions. This arrangement is inclusive without jeopardising a male-only safe space to pursue men's health aims. This arrangement comes with its challenges including accommodating extra sessions which puts pressure on key holders and Shed supervisors to maintain safe operating.

I've heard many solutions-focussed 'yes, we can' responses when visiting Sheds and will outline two of them here

When a group of women asked if they could use the Shed's facilities. The response from the Shed was yes, we can accommodate your request if you can run women's sessions by sourcing your own training for your own Shed supervisors and key holders and can satisfy Trustees that this can be done safely.

Taking a phone call from a social prescriber asking if the Shed could provide for one of their prescribees. The Shed's answer was yes, we can although you will need to visit our Shed so that you understand the limitations and challenges we face and that the Shed is run by volunteers without specialist training. In partnership, we will need to ensure that four parties are fully satisfied with the arrangement.

- The social prescriber is assured their prescribee's needs can be met
- 2. The prescribee is confident that it a safe space for them.
- 3. Shed Trustees are happy that the prescribee has a level of independence and that their needs can met whilst maintaining shed ethos.
- 4. Shedders are kept informed and are supportive.

You will also need to chum your prescribee along for a few sessions to support their integration into Shed life.

It is important to remember that Men's Sheds are bottom-up grassroots organisations that are improving the lives of men, their families and their communities. The sometimes life-saving health benefits experienced by men are not just for a narrow community of interest.

Shedders are partners, workers, sons, parents, siblings, grandparents, veterans, neighbours, citizens and community leaders. Sheds bring considerable social value to their geographical community in terms of social cohesion, community empowerment and social return on investment. Anything that risks the ability of Men's Sheds to tackle loneliness and isolation and achieve health and suicide prevention objectives must be very carefully considered.

Your Unforgotten Forces safari

Rather than spotlight an Unforgotten Forces partner charity in this issue, we are taking you on a tour of them all.

To begin, a reminder that one day's pay and one day's service in uniform with HM Armed Forces can open the door to a raft of extra support in later life. Lots of charities offer help to the ex-service men, women and their families, which can be confusing. The Unforgotten Forces partnership aims to make it easy to find support and to coordinate that support for the best possible impact.

As later life can bring new challenges and opportunities, access to trusted information and advice is vital. The <u>Age Scotland</u> Helpline provides a free, confidential phone service for older people, their carers and families on matters including health, housing and money. The <u>Armed Services Advice Project</u> is dedicated to ex-service personnel of all ages with local staff available in many areas who can also help with things like welfare benefits paperwork.

Many Unforgotten Forces partners offer practical support including:


- <u>Poppyscotland's Welfare Support Services</u> can help with financial support and mobility home adaptations etc:
- SSAFA case workers can do home visits, assess need and source support and funding to meet these needs;
- The <u>RAF Association</u> provides dedicated support to those who have served in the RAF and their families;
- In mainland Highland and Moray, there's a <u>handyperson service</u> (from ILM Highland) solely for older exservice personnel; and
- Across Scotland, Fares4Free offers solutions for those with transport-related challenges.

Unforgotten Forces can also assist with health-related matters. <u>Sight Scotland Veterans</u> offers support to enhance quality of life, and enable independent living, for ex-service personnel with sight loss. In many NHS areas, <u>Defence Medical Welfare Service</u> offers support through a period of hospital treatment. And, <u>Combat Stress</u> is there for those with mental health needs, particularly where related to Armed Service experiences.

Social connection is key to wellbeing and so is a major focus for Unforgotten Forces.

- Legion Scotland supports those who have become socially isolated to reconnect with their communities;
- Near Bishopton, Erskine has a fabulous centre offering camaraderie and fun activities;
- Veterans Tribe Scotland runs creative and social activities, online and in-person;
- Age Scotland and the RAF Association run telephone-based friendship services;
- And, of course, we're proud to have <u>Scottish Men's Sheds Association</u> within our partnership's ranks.

Supporting Scotland's Older Veterans

SHED IN THE SPOTLIGHT—ORKNEY MEN'S SHED





After two years without a Shed building, the SMSA catches up with Orkney Men's Shed Chairman Morgan Harcus to discuss their journey so far and their exciting plans for a fresh start at their new premises in Garson Park, Stromness.

In October last year, it was announced that Orkney Men's Shed, along with two other charities — Stromness Drama Club and the Orkney Historical Boat Society— would be granted a 10-year lease for the Old Herring Factory building with ample space and storage for their members and potential for growth. And now, the Orcadian Shedders are in the building, unpacked and raring to go.

Morgan said: "I was made aware of Men's Sheds seven years ago through former Westhill & District Men's Shed Chairman Dave Thomson who invited me to visit their Shed. Within minutes of coming through the door, I just knew that Orkney could benefit from a Shed.

to take action and began looking at the local paper's property section and saw a building for sale in Finstown on Maitland Place. I phoned the man selling it, who strangely had the same initials as me and was a Harcus too. He explained that they had been trying to sell the building for a while

"Not long after that, Voluntary Action Orkney (VAO) arranged a public meeting at The Life Centre to raise awareness of Men's Sheds and discuss the potential for having one in Orkney. I was amazed that 55 interested people turned up to that meeting to support the proposal. From there, we formed a committee – all five members bring their own individual skills and are still on the committee today plus two new Trustees.



"From day one, the Committee has been working towards a common goal to help local men. Luckily, we all get along so well and got to work with the task ahead. We all made the decision to put in £50 each to set up a bank account for the charity and we received Westhill Men's Shed's constitution to use as a template and adapt it, with VAO's help, to meet our needs.

"Then came the hunt for premises. We originally applied for a former primary school which had been empty for 17 years and would have made an ideal Shed but after several meetings with the local authority we were unfortunately unsuccessful in our pursuit. That night, I was extremely disheartened but decided to take action and began looking at the local paper's property section and saw a building for sale in Finstown on Maitland Place. I phoned the man initials as me and was a Harcus too. He explained that they had been trying to sell the building for a while and they were now considering taking it off the market to lease it out. He also mentioned that someone else had contacted him and was interested in the building.

"That same evening, I got a call from our Secretary Andy Swain asking why I was looking at the same building as him and it turned out that he was the other interested party! Well, not too long after that, we signed the lease on the building and applied for a change of use. Thanks to the generosity of the public, we soon had it up and running and kitted out with donated tools and machinery and we held our official opening on the 29th September 2017 with over 200 people in attendance.

"Over the years, we made many improvements to the building and something that was extremely

important to us was to make the building fully accessible for our members. To achieve this, we required a disabled toilet and access. Unfortunately, our planning application was refused by Orkney Islands Council (OIC) due to road safety/vehicle access concerns and our appeal was also rejected.

"We were asked to vacate the premises in October 2019 and had just lost our Shed when COVID struck. Due to the pandemic, members started meeting virtually but we felt like we were losing the contact of what Men's Sheds are all about. When it was safe to do so, we started holding meetings temporarily at the Finstown Community Centre who were very kind to only charge us £10 a meeting.

"We enjoyed chatting and planning and also held 'Bring and Tell' sessions which went down a treat however, we just had to find premises for our members to meet and do what a Shed should. Our members are men from their early 20s to late 80s – a great mix of lads with various skills, experience, backgrounds and interests - and we just could not lose these intergenerational bonds and friendships. Having no workshop made life difficult as we couldn't work on community projects or raise funds through this avenue either.

"One day, I was talking to the Interim Chief Executive of OIC John Mundell who we have a brilliant relationship with. He was listening to our woes and dreams of a new build and plot of land, when he said 'I will fix this for you'. Not long after that, discussions around the 15-year-old two-storey Old Herring Factory building, which had been empty for 10 years.

"Any attempts to sell the building were unsuccessful and the council offered it to us, and two other charities, on an initial 10-year lease at day. a nominal rent. The building required a bit of work to be done by the council to bring it up to today's standards such as replacement of the lift and adaptations to the disabled toilet but on out first viewing, we were really impressed and it did not need any big work or investment from us.

"The only downfall with the new building is its location is in Stromness which for some of our members would double the distance to travel. Our Finstown site was far more central. The new building however is significantly bigger than our last Shed, and fully accessible, and therefore gives us the potential to grow and welcome new members. The other two charities using the building will primarily use it for storage so the rest of the space is ours. The Shed's allocated rooms includes a workshop with large woodworking area, a craft/ computing room, electrical testing and repair room, a large social area/ canteen and lots of storage.

"In addition to the computers in our craft room, there will also be space for modelling, Japanese Kumiko, watch and camera maintenance, pyrography, leatherworking etc – and with additional space there is also scope for more to be implemented to meet our members' needs.

"Plans in the pipeline include purchasing a 3D printer, aspirations for a new metalworking space, picture framing and a tool sharpening service. We also plan to promote the Shed's new premises as much as possible and are attending three upcoming agricultural shows to do just that. We also extend an



invitation for Sheds and community groups to come visit us and see the new premises - we recently welcomed a visit from the Deerness Senior Citizens who had a fantastic

"We must thank John Mundell, Karen Greaves (OIC's Head of Executive Support), James Stocken (Council Leader), elected members of the Council and others who helped get us back in a Shed so our charity can get back to what we do best – supporting men's health and wellbeing. We were delighted to be mentioned by Christine Grahame MSP at the recent **Scottish Parliament debate on Men's** Sheds and recognised for our vital work. The support we have received from the community has been huge, they really appreciate what we are trying to achieve here.

"We were so happy in our previous Shed and if none of this had happened then we would still be there today however, after everything we have been through, we strongly believe everything happens for a reason and it is onwards and upwards from here on. We have come out the other side and are delighted with the new space we have. We currently have 160 members but this is constantly growing and we are delighted to have beginning on Facebook and/or visit welcomed a good few new members recently and with that brings fresh ideas.

"Orkney is not a huge place but there is certainly room for more than one Shed on the islands. We have been delighted to support the new Sanday Men's Shed as it develops. We visited them and presented our work and we have also offered them some of our surplus tools to get them started. We will continue to help them in any way we can. Recently, a group of us also visited Flotta to help them establish a Shed which will bring the count of Sheds in Orkney to three.



"Over the last few months, members have been at the new premises clearing and setting up our new space and moving all 18 pallets full of our tools and equipment. The workshop is almost up and running ready to start with our list of 17 (and counting) projects and the new lift has just been installed earlier this month. We are looking forward to the members dusting off their flat caps, bib and brace/boilersuits and sharpening the chisels and plane irons ready to go."

OIC Councillor Leslie Manson said: "I am delighted that not only are we divesting ourselves of a building that has been standing empty, but much more importantly we are breathing new life into three very meritorious organisations whose charitable activities undoubtedly contribute to, and have been evidenced to promote, the improvement of health and social wellbeing, cultural heritage and involvement of our young people this is what Orkney is all about.

Orkney Men's Shed is planning an official opening in September 2022 (watch this space) but in the meantime, they are open to members and potential new members on Tuesdays and Thursdays 10am to 4pm. Follow their new their website for the latest updates.

The members of Carluke Men's Shed (CMS) have been on their travels of late for team building, excursions and visits to local schools.

Shed Treasurer Tom Kennedy, on behalf of CMS, said: "We visited Carluke High School recently, it was a great opportunity to meet some of the pupils and we also got a tour of their fantastic woodworking room. We had a very interesting chat with the headteacher and some of the teachers and to say we were all really impressed would be an understatement.

"The pupils will soon visit our Shed's portable cabins, currently situated at the High Mill site, after they return from their summer holidays. We will then continue our discussions on intergenerational enterprise initiatives. Hopefully, we will all learn from each other and further develop this partnership going forward working with them on different projects.

"The Shed then organised a mini-bus excursion to the Summerlee Museum of Scottish Industrial Life in Coatbridge for a model railway exhibition. Everyone had a great day and the weather was kind to us to enable a wee picnic outdoors. We hope this will be the first of many Shed excursions/trips during the summer months.

"Thankfully, the rain held off for most of the day and from start to finish, the Shedders on the stand were kept busy with enquiries from people from far and wide.

"We were well stocked up with SMSA brochures to hand out to people outwith the Biggar District to promote the Scottish Men's Shed Movement and how to find their local Shed. We were also able to sell quite a number of our woodworking projects and local MP David Mundell stopped by for a chat as well—so it was an extremely productive day.

"Throughout July, we were also able to complete our long awaited polytunnel. It may have taken a bit longer than anticipated to complete but it will be of great benefit to the Shedders with green fingers. Our planters have been built and by the end of July planting had begun.

"It is our intention to modernise our Shed's heating and insulation requirements. The first stage, to install a log burner, is now complete and this will make a huge difference in the winter months especially with the massive increase in electricity costs expected.

"In mid-August, all of the windows and doors of the Shed are to be replaced to make them more energy efficient. This has all been made possible thanks to the <u>Clyde Extension Community Fund</u> who funded these essential improvements."

The team started working on the physical aspects of the campsite—marking, water supply etc—with Bob and other Shedders pulling the logistics chain together for the supply of cleaning materials, hosing, food, beverages and the necessary disposable dining materials in to ensure all ducks were in a row at the breakfast bar.

The team working on the exterior campsite requirements ensured there was a constant water supply to areas of the campsite and that areas were clearly marked/barriered to ensure camper safety.

Shed Treasurer Tom Hannan said: "Working in partnership with Aberdeenshire Alcohol & Drug Partnership, Shed Trustees agreed that the Shed's social area would make a perfect family-friendly and drug/alcohol free area—with comfortable seating, beverages and homebakes – for the enjoyment of those who wished to use it during the festival.

"The session in the Shed kicked off on day one at around 10.30am with a ukulele workshop for "strummers" of various capabilities. It was great to see our Shed member Mike McInally (pictured above—happy, bearded face) as well as a young father and his wee lassie join the session also.

"At noon, the musicians started arriving for the session, timed to go on until 4pm. Once the music started, the





footfall through the Shed increased significantly. We had a young family from Northern California who played fiddles, guys from Durham with flutes and local musicians with guitars, accordions and banjoes.

...cross stitch, painting, crochet, greeting card making, tea and natter club, jewellery making, basic cooking skills, upcycling skills, sewing and knitting for beginners, flower pressing, scrapbooking, movie club, video games club, sugar paste flower making, basic education classes, english, geography classes. book club, creative writing, flower arranging, sewing group, soap making, spinning, macrame, digital art lessons, quilting, home furnishings, activities for the less skilled, hanging baskets, baking, cocktail making, bridge club, basic holiday language club, wine club, watercolour painting, musical instrument club,



sailing theory lessons, dancing lessons, adjusting sewing patterns and other clothes making skills, pyrography, basic first aid, card game club, mod/civil service group, copper wire jewellery making, sea glass sculpting, dremel tool skills, chess club, ethnic community clubs, embroidery, stamp collecting, coin collecting, basic stocks and shares club, smaller community meetings venue and air dry clay modelling.

"The wealth of ideas generated by the community will be discussed at the next Arts & Crafts Sub-Committee meeting and we will keep the community informed of our ongoing plans through our newsletters and social media channels.

"We also had interest shown in the following ideas: woodwork for ladies; car maintenance for ladies; picture framing; DIY skills for ladies; and driftwood sculpting. 'One big happy family' at Kennoway Community Shed

'Volunteers are not paid. Not because they are worthless but because they are priceless'.

Never a truer word spoken and this statement is written on one of the many signs proudly displayed at Kennoway Community Shed.

When the SMSA received an email from a member of Kennoway Community Shed wishing to sharing his personal experience since joining the Shed and singing the praises of two stalwart volunteers, we just knew the story had to be shared.

Kennoway Community Shed member Ian Low said: "I have been a member of the Shed since last October and in that time I have watched how the Shed is run. Bob McPhail (Chairman) and Margaret Moffet do an absolutely fantastic job—they make every person that walks through the door feel comfortable and it really is one big happy family.

"I have been experiencing mental health problems since January this year and was admitted to hospital in February. Bob brought clothes and items I needed from my home into me and he also phones me every night to see how I am. When I am discharged for a few days, Bob comes and gives me a lift home.

"I can't sing their praises high enough—nothing is impossible for them.

"They have really went over and above to support me since day one and for that I am eternally grateful."

Health matters at Bridge of Don Men's Shed

Earlier this month, the members of <u>Bridge of Don Men's Shed</u> received a talk on the importance of Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA) Screening. The 20-minute talk was delivered by Jill Pickard, an AAA Screener at NHS Grampian.

AAA screening is an ultrasound scan for men 65 years or above to ensure that they don't have an aneurysm. The majority of 65-75 year-old men will have already been scanned because the service started ten years ago however Jill is reaching out to Men's Sheds in her region

to offer the chance for over 75-year-olds to be scanned.

Bridge of Don Men's Shed also ensured it had a strong presence at its recent local wellbeing event, organised by Danestone Community Centre and the Aberdeen Health and Social Care Partnership last month. The 'Staying Well in the Cost of Living Crisis' event featured exhibitors, information and advice on topics including health and wellbeing; finances; physical activity; and sustainable food and nutrition.

Eric Bisset said: "The event was well attended by the community and it was also useful to have time to network with the other exhibitors. We had enquiries from a lot of wives, interested in hearing all about the Shed and taking information home to their husbands. I think it is really important to get out and about to events like these to raise awareness of what the Shed offers. We have a potential few new members and it was an extremely worthwhile afternoon."



Springburn Park Shedders get creative with community artists

Springburn Park Men's Shed unveiled its impressive new mural—created by 15 of their Shedders working alongside community artists from the national arts programme, Culture Collective—at a celebratory event earlier this month.

The grand unveiling at Springburn Park on Saturday 6th August 2022, marked the end of the ten-week collaboration between Shed members and Toonspeak—one of the 26 participatory arts projects in the Culture Collective network.

SMSA Chief Executive Officer Jason Schroeder said: "Whilst in a Scottish Community Alliance (SCA) meeting on Zoom one day, I was absolutely delighted to hear one of our Shed members being highlighted in a story of best practise collaboration between community groups so we just had to find out more."

Programme Lead for Creative Scotland's <u>Culture</u> <u>Collective</u> Kathryn Welch presented on the Collective programme and how the projects can bring people together and connect arts and community-rooted projects. Each of the projects are unique and driven by the communities in which they are based. <u>Toonspeak</u>, a Glasgow-based youth theatre and arts organisation is one of the 26 organisations involved in the pilot programme and is on a mission to transform lives through creativity.

Karyn described in her presentation that they had worked with Springburn Park Men's Shed as a way of artists supporting community projects and how they can play a role in connecting that activity to other projects in the local area. Other organisations that they are working in partnership with in Glasgow include Barmulloch Community Development Company, Springburn, Tron St Mary's Parish Church and the Wallacewell Community Fellowship.

Culture Collective Project Manager Emma Stewart-Jones said: "We currently have 11 artists that we are working with (five assistant artists, five associate artists and one lead) who work with people to realise their potential and become leaders and contributing members of their communities. Our activities—all provided at zero cost—

include theatre, music, dance, visual arts, poetry and creative writing, theatre and singing.

"Toonspeak is based in Ward 17 which includes Springburn and we noticed a lack of men participating in the project and wanted to address that. I got in touch with

Tom Bennett at Springburn Park Men's Shed and discussed that we were struggling to engage with men. Tom mentioned that they were keen to have a mural painted on the side of their Shed and we suggested that our artists work with Shed members to teach them how to do it themselves and be involved. This way, they get the new mural in addition to learning a new skill.

"Fifteen members of the Shed quickly signed up to get involved and over the course of ten-weeks, worked alongside our Lead Artist Philipa Tomlin and Associate Visual Artist John-Martin Fulton to design and create the end product—featuring everything they wanted to be represented to cover local landmarks and the history and industrial heritage of Springburn—which I am sure you will agree is truly magnificent!"

Springburn Park Men's Shed is based on Belmont Road, Springburn Park, Glasgow and currently has 83 members. The Shed meets on Tuesdays, Wednesdays & Thursdays from 10am to 3pm and Mondays and Fridays 10am to 1pm for their outdoor handyman service. Shed activities include woodwork, metalwork, horticulture, pyrography, book swap, computing and bikes. The Shed also has a new allotment offsite in Springburn. "As we emerge from the pandemic, Men's Sheds offer an excellent way to bring our communities together. Their positive contribution could not be more important or timely and they deserve our full support, especially through greater funding."


Euan said: "Following a delay of over two years due to the pandemic, we are thrilled to finally let audiences in to see our work. Our plans were scrubbed following the cancellation of our tour originally planned to start in May 2020 and we really didn't know what was going to happen with the play.

"One day, we heard the announcement that <u>Eden Court</u> was teaming up with the <u>Pleasance Theatre Trust</u> as part of their Edinburgh National Partnerships programme. In February of this year, an open call was put out for dynamic Scottish artists/companies to apply to take their work to Edinburgh Fringe 2022. We didn't have anything to lose so applied, pitched the play and were delighted to be selected as a partner.

"I first experienced a Men's Shed when I met members of Forres & District Men's Shed through Moray Waste Busters. It was great to see them in action, have a good blether with the guys and hear the stories they had to share.

"I also visited the first Scottish Men's Shed, Westhill & District Men's Shed, which is such a fantastic place in addition to Inverurie & District Men's Shed and meeting the Shedders in Keith and Fochabers. Each Shed is unique in what they offer their members and how they support them and that really inspired me.





"After a career of 35 years in social work, my interest in the ethos of Men's Sheds has always been there. I met Jason Schroeder, Chief Executive Officer of the Scottish Men's Sheds Association, through Moray Council and found his enthusiasm and passion when speaking about the Men's Sheds Movement, so motivational.

"The theatre piece that Dave and I have created is a warm story of one man's highs and lows. Without giving the story away, in the beginning our character is adamant that the Shed life is just not for him—'no way, I'm not going, it's not for me' he says. Then, he thinks about it—he can continue to stay at home feeling insecure and lonely or he can get out there and socialise. The show will make you think, laugh and maybe even cry at times."

The Edinburgh Fringe run at The Pleasance marks the world premiere of the show. The play—recently commended at the <u>Men's Shed's debate in Scottish Parliament</u> on 16th June—is previewing until Monday 29th August (with the exception of Monday 22nd August). Transatlantic partnership supports American Shedder to make traditional Scottish Spurtle

Surfing the internet for interesting projects takes one down many rabbit trails, some of which are dead ends, and some which open to new and beautiful vistas of insight and understanding - such was my discovery of the Scottish Spurtle.

I had heard the term "spurtle" but never gave it much thought until I saw it mentioned somewhere and began with a Google search. I soon discovered that there are numerous versions and uses – from the traditional Scottish Spurtle used to stir porridge (what we might call oatmeal or grits) to the Continental and American versions which are a combination of spoon and spatula used for stirring, lifting, turning and scraping.

Being of Scottish ancestry, I found myself interested in learning more about the traditional Scottish Spurtle which I learned was more of a rod or dowel with decorative elements used by cooks since at least the 15th century. And, after pondering who would be most likely to know about Scottish Spurtles and be able to guide me in the making of one, I was led to write to the Scottish Men's Sheds

Association (SMSA) where much to my surprise and pleasure they replied to my query.

Michelle Wibrew, the Communications and PR Officer was instrumental in arranging contacts with Liz Ness and George "Barrie" Baker from The Inverclyde Shed's pen and carving group who were very generous with their time and knowledge and helped guide me in making my first spurtles.

I decided to make my first spurtles from some storm damaged Walnut scraps that we had lying around our Shed—the Ruston Community Men's Shed in Louisiana, USA. The Men's Shed movement is gaining popularity in the U.S. now with over a dozen active sheds across the country and our Shed was one of the first members of the U.S. Men's Shed Association.

I quickly discovered how elementary my lathe skills are. I made my first spurtle a bit too long and large, but did incorporate the traditional thistle top for which was given kind critique which did not bruise my ego or discourage my desire to continue in my attempts at creating a proper spurtle.

A picture of a beautifully carved spurtle made by Liz and some helpful hints gave me inspiration for my second attempt which I turned, again out of Walnut, but made smaller and more delicate with hand carving of the Thistle head. I have renewed



respect for turners and carvers like Liz and Barrie that make a difficult task appear easy. I believe that my next spurtle should be made of a tighter grained wood that is less prone to tear out and misdirecting of carving tools.

I must say how appreciative I am to the SMSA, Liz and Barrie for the kind and generous guidance in helping me learn more about the Scottish Spurtle – its design, use and construction.

Liz Ness from The Inverclyde Shed said: "We were delighted to give Dean some assistance with his project. We shared photos and liaised with him via email to give our suggestions on adjustments to the design, size and shape. He certainly had the required skills and had no problems producing the perfect Scottish spurtle."



Stanley Shedders create bespoke 3D printed piece for lame horse

Stanley and District Men's Shed received an enquiry from a local farrier that was a bit out of the norm—to 3D print a bespoke piece which was to be moulded on to a lame horses hoof.

Stanley Shedder Mike Baillie said "Stanley village and the wider community have a Facebook page and it was through this medium that a local farrier put out a call to find someone local with 3D printing capabilities.

"I saw the enquiry and responded on behalf of the Shed that we could help. On this occasion, there was no design input required from the Shed—although we have that capability—as the farrier had received the files from a colleague in Florida, USA.

"The farrier did not know what to do with the files as he did not have the necessary software. He forwarded them on to us and we were able to print off the items as two separate lots—the main part and the removable screw which is circa 4" diameter.



"The simple design shows that the main body is fixed under the hoof with a casting a bit like dental impression material, the screw is located to protect the sole of the hoof and it can be removed for access for a veterinary inspection.

"Each piece took around four hours to print and 40 metres of filament so a days worth of printing but we got the job done and the farrier was delighted. Hopefully the horse was too!"


"We put out a call for local volunteers who would like to learn more about

Bon voyage

At last, the Erebus project is on course for Antarctica!

Following the last update from Turriff and District Men's Shed in the May 2021 issue of The Scottish Shedder, the boats HMS Erebus and Terror are being shipped from Bristol to the Falkland's on Tuesday 16th August 2022 then on to South Georgia to be launched into the Antarctic Circumpolar Current to circumnavigate the Earth—a journey of two years.

The Shed responded to a call from a local family and their two sons, Ollie and Harry (pictured below with the boats), to support the project to build two scaled-down (one-metre long) replica wooden ships. The build was based on the original 1839 admiralty drawings. Plans included fitting tracking and data collecting sensors for a sail of over 20,000 km 13,000 miles and encompassing four of the world's oceans.

It was the dream of two young boys to replicate the Ross Expedition of 1839-1843 and that has became a reality with a little help from Bill Little and Gerry Quinn from the Shed.

Progress will be tracked by satellite link daily. A full description of the Erebus project can be seen on Turriff and District Men's Shed's website.





Alcohol Marketing

Alcohol Focus Scotland (AFS)—the national charity working to prevent and reduce alcohol harm—is interested in how alcohol marketing affects people in recovery and is reaching out to speak to willing groups.



AFS wants to reduce the impact of alcohol on individuals, families, communities and Scotland as a whole, through the implementation of effective alcohol control policies and legislation. The charity strives to see fewer people have their health damaged or lives cut short due to alcohol, fewer children and families suffering as a result of other people's drinking and communities free from alcohol-related crime and violence.

In 2017, AFS published 'Promoting good health from childhood: Reducing the impact of marketing on children in Scotland'. This report recommended a number of restrictions that should be placed on alcohol marketing in Scotland based on the extensive evidence that exposure to alcohol marketing reduces the age at which young people start to drink and increases the amount they drink if they are already drinking.

The Scottish Government has accepted the need for action and is planning to consult on potential marketing restrictions later in 2022. While there is significant evidence and attention being given to the impact of alcohol marketing on children and young people, AFS has been keen to highlight the impact of marketing on other groups who might be particularly affected. In order to do this, they are reaching out to speak to any willing groups from Scottish Men's Sheds. Interviews can be carried out on a one-to-one basis or through focus groups. All information gathered will be anonymous (unless requested otherwise).

In particular, they are interested in how marketing impacts on people in recovery from alcohol problems, people with alcohol dependence and people who are drinking at high levels.

AFS commissioned a literature review which found there has been relatively little academic study into the impact of marketing on these groups.

AFS is therefore keen to bring the voices of people in recovery more fully into this debate to increase understanding of how alcohol marketing can impact on people in recovery from alcohol problems.

Tools for Mozambique

Whilst on a recent train journey, Tony Nelson from Lauderdale Community Shed was reading an article in his woodwork magazine about a community empowerment scheme to donate unwanted hand tools for Mozambique. Tony asked the SMSA to get in touch with the organiser to find out more and share the initiative with 'The Scottish Shedder' readers.

Rob Wilson from timber importers Dalmann UK, who launched the scheme, tells the SMSA all about the project and how Scottish Men's Sheds can help out.

Rob said: "The tool donation scheme was launched due to the vital need for simple hand tools, particularly for woodworking, for the communities of Mozambique. Sometimes, in our well or even over-equipped workshops, sheds and garages we are still on a quest to accumulate the latest tool to make life easier or develop new skills despite already having an array of machines, tools and accessories at our fingertips.

"Our principal supplier, TCT-Dalmann Lda, is located in the back of beyond in remote Sofala Province—an area of rural wilderness with virtually no development or employment opportunities of any kind. Local inhabitants are subsistence farmers growing a few crops and supplementing their diets by foraging in the bush around them.

"At Dalmann UK, we are focussed on delivering ways to empower the communities of Mozambique. In addition to the tool donation project, we have implemented various initiatives including the building of schools, supplying a gasifier for power generation and reforestation schemes.

"The local sawmill has introduced a woodturning school offering free training to any interested locals. The aim of this training is to create self-employment opportunities for the students and a market for their turnings. This will enable them to enjoy a cash income from their efforts.

"Currently all turnings at the sawmill are made with handmade tools and chisels. The driving motive is to show that with a little ingenuity and some help, local people can learn to convert what might otherwise be fire wood into a commercial product that could become a reliable source of income for them.

"The current tools in use are hand forged from confiscated poaching traps using local charcoal and used on their only wood turning lathe. Dalmann UK has appealed to major UK suppliers to turners and woodworkers to ask them to donate any redundant tools to this cause. We are now extending this plea to Men's Sheds—some of which receive many donations of tools that are surplus to their requirements—to contribute to a very worthy charitable cause that will reach and benefit the recipients directly.

"The quality of the tools is not important as these can be repaired and something is certainly better than nothing. In this scenario even old carbon steel tools—which most of us have eschewed in favour of high speed steel and other fancy steels—would be gratefully accepted.

"The initial list of suppliers who have signed up to support this worthy cause are: Charnwood; Exotic Hardwoods UK; Reid Timbers; Snainton Woodworking; Stiles & Bates; Surrey Timbers; Turners Retreat; WP Hardwoods; and Yandles & Son. These suppliers have installed a box for the tools to be dropped off and when there is an adequate amount, Dalmann will arrange and fund the collections and export to Mozambique."


The DesHCA Project wants to know about how you make your home work for you

Nature Prescriptions: Supporting the health of people and nature

What Do Men Think?

We've never been more aware of the benefits of nature for our health and wellbeing, particularly following our experiences over the COVID pandemic.

Over the past five years, <u>RSPB</u> has been developing 'Nature Prescriptions', working with GPs and other health professionals to embed the value of nature to health across primary care.

Nature Prescriptions are designed to support healthcare professionals to formally prescribe connecting with nature so their patients can harness the benefits of nature for physical and mental health and wellbeing. A Nature Prescription can be offered as part of a treatment plan for patients or given to someone for whom the GP assesses would benefit from this natural, non-clinical intervention.

The prescription is supported by a leaflet and a calendar of local, seasonal activities. All are designed to help foster a deeper and meaningful connection with nature and all can be undertaken individually as part of a person's everyday life.

Nature Prescriptions began as a partnership between RSPB Scotland and NHS Shetland in 2017 and expanded a year later into Edinburgh. It was well-received by local GPs and patients and clearly benefited over 80% of patients who participated.

However, what the RSPB has found so far is that they are reaching far fewer men than women – and they want to understand why that is and what they can do to address this gender imbalance. They know that men don't attend GPs as often as women do and so want to find out if there is another way to reach men to encourage them to make this nature connection. They also know that the language they may use around feelings and the approach of encouraging mindfulness may not feel as accessible to men and may be off-putting for some.

RSPB Scotland wants to hear from men across the country about how you feel about the health benefits of nature, and how you think they could reach more men with this important message. This will help develop the project to be more relevant, accessible and meaningful for men for whom being in nature could be an important tool in their toolbox for looking after their physical and mental health.

Some posters in the video's comments section said that Myles had simply produced a 'lamb stew' whilst others highlighted that 'Stovies are peasant food made with tatties, corned beef and an onion if you're lucky.'

They say don't knock it until you have tried it, so why not give this quick and easy recipe a go...you might just like it.

Ingredients

- Butter for frying
- 500g diced lamb
- 5 medium potatoes (chunky chopped)
- 1 onion (diced)
- 3 carrots (chunky chopped)
- Tiger bread to serve
- 500ml of beef or lamb stock
- Salt and pepper (season to taste)

Method

- 1. Chunky dice all of your vegetables and lamb into good chunky bite-sized pieces
- Brown your lamb in an oven-proof dish with the butter for a few minutes before adding the diced onions to fry them off
- 3. Add in the remaining chopped vegetables (potatoes and carrots)
- 4. Add salt and pepper to your preference
- 5. Pour in your stock and give it a good stir
- 6. Put the lid on your dish and cook covered for 1 hr 30 mins or until the vegetables have all softened
- 7. Cut your tiger bread in half and remove some of the centre
- 8. Serve up your Stovies inside the tiger bread
- 9. Season to taste and enjoy!
